## Sewer Improvements

### \$288,150.00 Grant Awarded to Albion Borough

Borough Manager, Gary Wells and Wastewater Treatment Plant Supervisor, Robert Fuller applied for the PA Small Water and Sewer Program Grant. On September 4, 2020 a letter of approval for \$288,150.00 was issued.

Albion Borough was awarded a grant for \$288,150.00 through the PA Small Water and Sewer Program. This grant has allowed

Wastewater Treatment Plant Supervisor, Robert Fuller, to move forward with his Sanitary Sewer Improvement Project on Walnut Street. The project consists of construction of approximately 2,200-lineal feet of 8-inch sanitary relief sewer to prevent sewage back-ups and

Protect public health. Albion Borough has recently undertaken major upgrades to the Wastewater Treatment Plant to significantly improve long-term sustainability of the treatment system. The Borough completed a smoke and dye test of the sewer system to reduce extraneous water.

This project was a key infrastructure component to allow for continued and future economic development. Inadequate capacity results in connection limitations being imposed by the PA DEP.
